# Report on DeliverEd Ghana Research Dissemination Workshop

26TH JUNE, 2023

## PREPARED BY THE GHANA RESEACH TEAM





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#### Introduction

The DeliverEd Ghana Research Dissemination Workshop was organized in Tamale and Cape Coast on the 12th and 15th of June 2023, respectively, with the primary objective of presenting the findings from the DeliverEd Ghana study participants at the subnational level. The workshop aimed to foster an environment of feedback and discussion among the participants, which would serve as a crucial element in formulating appropriate policy recommendations based on the research findings.

#### Workshop Structure

The workshop was divided into multiple sessions, including presentations, breakout session discussions, and interactive sessions, designed to facilitate active engagement and knowledge exchange among the research team and participants (see Appendix A and B for the list).

#### **Presentation of Research Findings**

The researchers (see the workshop agendas in Appendix C for the names) presented the key findings of the DeliverEd Ghana study, comprising the:

- 1. national-level study that aimed to trace the origin and impacts of the delivery approach led by the Reform Secretariat;
- 2. qualitative study, based on in-depth interviews in 3 regional and 5 district offices, that sought to understand how delivery approaches were being used at subnational level; and
- quantitative study, based on a nationally-representative survey, that aimed to document the use of delivery approaches across 174 districts alongside the knowledge, attitudes, and behaviours of district and school staff.

Regarding the national-level study, some of the findings presented were that:

- introducing and strengthening management routines on accountability, coordination, and problem-solving led to increased capacity to deliver on national-level output targets.
- coordination and problem-solving routines were noted to have led to a sense of empowerment and ownership amongst national education agency heads.
- the presence and attention of the Minister in quarterly 'accounting to the Minister' meetings served as a very powerful incentive for reform owners to achieve performance targets.

- NERS provided capacity building to reform owners to identify KPIs, set targets, and monitor their performance.
- As of the end of 2021, national agencies reported changes in their internal management practices (e.g., the introduction of target-setting and data review within agencies).
- there was a strong initial emphasis on high-stakes accountability through 'accounting to the Minister' meetings and performance agreements. Over time, the emphasis shifted away from high-stakes accountability to coordination.

In relation to the sub-national study, some of the findings presented were that:

- there were wide variations between districts and schools in the extent of adoption and impact of the new delivery approach routines. Thus, in some districts, district office staff and head teachers demonstrated a strong, consistent understanding of performance contracts, shaping district priorities. However, In other districts, there was limited knowledge of performance contract specifics and implementation processes and confusion with GALOP contracts. In three district offices and two regional offices, the new KPIs shifted the focus of monitoring activities and data collection, but annual targets were not broken down into appropriate quarterly targets, sometimes due to limited capacity, so monitoring could not be fully effective.
- there was evidence that performance contracts were beginning to increase activities in some regions/districts at the end of year one implementation (e.g., support for SMCs and PLCs).

Concerning the quantitative study, some of the findings presented were that:

- on average, district offices make only moderate use of management practices. Thus, the average district is strong on priority setting by making more use of strategic planning.
- the average district office uses problem-solving practices more than (top-down) accountability practices.
- at the school level, teacher absenteeism was moderate by regional standards (13%), and classroom instructions met international benchmarks.
- 22% of the office staff were likely/very likely to leave their jobs.
- even though the evidence suggested a positive relationship between management functions and performance, not all functions matter equally.

Evidence points towards benefits from problem-solving, not top-down accountability routines.

#### **Breakout session Discussions**

The breakout session discussions at the workshop centred around three key questions: (1) What key things did you take away from these presentations? (2) How are you working to improve the delivery role of district and regional offices? (3) What innovations or areas of challenge would you like to further develop? Workshop participants were actively encouraged to provide feedback and engage in discussions regarding the research findings and their implications. The participants engaged in insightful conversations, sharing their perspectives and experiences at the plenary.

#### Workshop Outcomes

By disseminating the research findings and engaging participants in discussions, the workshop raised awareness about the importance of delivery approaches in education provision. It encouraged participants to use the appropriate management practices to help enhance their roles at the district and regional education offices. Also, the workshop facilitated fruitful knowledge-sharing and collaboration among stakeholders from the various districts and regions. Thus, participants had the opportunity to learn from each other's experiences, exchange best practices, and establish networks for collaborations. Overall, the workshop fostered a sense of shared responsibility and collective action towards improving Ghana's education delivery.

#### Conclusion

The DeliverEd Ghana Research Dissemination Workshop successfully achieved its objectives of presenting research findings and promoting feedback and discussion among workshop participants. The feedback received during the workshop will serve as a valuable resource in formulating appropriate policy recommendations to enhance Ghana's educational system. The workshop also facilitated knowledge sharing, collaboration, and advocacy, strengthening the collective efforts towards improving education in Ghana. The workshop's success would not have been possible without the active participation and valuable contributions of all stakeholders involved, particularly the Education Commission and the UK Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO).
